Believing housing is a human right, we envision a community where all people have access to safe, stable, and affordable housing.


### What is PIT?


The Point-in-Time (PIT) Count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on a single night.

**SHELTERED Counts:** Temporary housing settings such as, emergency shelter, transitional housing, and safe havens.


**UNSHELTERED Counts:** Persons who reside in a place not meant for human habitation, such as cars, parks, sidewalks, abandoned buildings, on the street.




## **Chronic Count**

#### What is chronic homelessness?

- HUD:
  - A homeless individual with a disability as defined in section 401(9) of the McKinney-Vento Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. 11360(9)), who:
    - Lives in a place not meant for human habitation, a safe haven, or in an emergency shelter, and
    - Has been homeless and living as described for at least 12 months\* or on at least 4 separate occasions in the last 3 years, as long as the combined occasions equal at least 12 months and each break in homelessness separating the occasions included at least 7 consecutive nights of not living as described.
- An individual who has been residing in an institutional care facility for less, including jail, substance abuse or mental health treatment facility, hospital, or other similar facility, for fewer than 90 days and met all of the criteria of this definition before entering that facility\*\*; or
- A family with an adult head of household (or, if there is no adult in the family, a minor head of household) who meets all of the
  criteria of this definition, including a family whose composition has fluctuated while the head of household has been homeless.

- \*A "break" in homeless is considered to be 7 or more nights.
- \*\*An individual residing in an institutional care facility does not constitute a break in homelessness.




# **Take Aways**







# What's Changed

#### • Women:

An increase in homeless females across shelter stats

#### • Families:

• A 17% increase of families seen from last year in those that are unsheltered

### • Aged:

- 20% increase in the 55+ age bracket from 2023
- 2.2% increase in the 62+ age bracket from 2023

# St. Johns County Homelessness at a glance

37 – 46 Year Old Male

1 in 3 odds of having a disability (physical or mental)

Homeless at least twice in the last 3 years with a 25% chance to be homeless again after your 3<sup>rd</sup> time

Sought assistance from 2-3 different agencies in the last 3 episodes of homelessness

Likely living alone – If you are in Transitional Housing/Emergency Shelter you are more likely to be in family.

25% chance your homeless experience started due to loss of income.

14% chance your homeless experience started due a relationship breakdown.

### Causes of Homelessness

- Financial Breakdown (lost job/benefits, increased rent/mortgage, etc.) – 48%
- Relationship Breakdown (family, romantic, friendship, roommate, etc.) 27%
- Health Reasons (addiction, physical condition, mental condition, etc.)
   20%
- Legal (went to jail/prison, evicted, etc.) 5%

# Community Feedback

What could the community use from the eyes of those experiencing homelessness:

- 1. Housing/Affordable Housing
- 2. Disability Assistance
- 3. Increased medical care for the homeless
- 4. Shelters
- 5. Higher paying jobs
- 6. Assistance with government documents (IDs, Birth Certificates)
- 7. Substance Abuse assistance
- 8. Side walks/Community infrastructure (such as buses)
- 9. Medication Assistance
- 10. Love and Compassion
